## ENG 12095: Reading & Writing for Academic Success II

**Prerequisite:** Passing grade in ENG 12095- Reading and Writing for Academic Success I

**Course Description:** This course is designed for high intermediate ESL students to further develop critical, academic thinking skills and English language proficiency in reading and writing. The course aims to prepare students for success in reading and writing tasks in academic settings.

- In reading, students will build on the reading fluency and analytical thinking skills established in Reading and Writing for Academic Success I. Students will construct a research paper which begins with extended reading in a chosen area. Students will continue to adequately present ideas and express opinions in a group using texts as evidence and support. Students will continue practicing different reading strategies to strengthen their reading skills and comprehension. Students will continue to build their background knowledge and increase vocabulary. Students will continue to strengthen their note taking and outlining abilities.
- **Reading Learning Outcomes -** Students will be able to:
  - 1. understand the main ideas and inferences in longer and more complex reading passages
  - 2. use a standard note-taking format to record main ideas and details of a reading
  - 3. accurately recognize and use academic vocabulary
  - 4. recognize text organizational patterns such as in argument structure in longer texts
- In writing, students will practice the elements of research writing while continuing to practice citations, summarizing, and paraphrasing. Students will learn to independently outline, revise and edit their own work. Additionally, students will continue to develop grammar, punctuation, vocabulary, spelling, more complex sentence structures and cohesion in their essays. By the end of the course, students will be able to produce a minimum of 6-8 pages of polished, academic writing.
- Writing Learning Outcomes Students will be able to:
  - 1. Summarize a three-page reading in a 150 -word summary
  - 3. produce a well constructed, developed, and research-writing supported argumentative essay
  - 4. demonstrate skill in quoting and paraphrasing source material using APA formatting

5. Compose professional written correspondence for a specific audience with appropriate vocabulary
